Ballot questions referred by the general assembly or any political subdivision are listed by letter, and ballot questions initiated by the people are listed numerically. A ballot question listed as an "amendment" proposes a change to the Colorado constitution, and a ballot question listed as a "proposition" proposes a change to the Colorado Revised Statutes. A "yes" vote on any ballot question is a vote in favor of changing current law or existing circumstances, and a "no" vote on any ballot question is a vote against changing current law or existing circumstances.
STATE OF COLORADO BALLOT QUESTIONS
<b>Amendment S (CONSTITUTIONAL)</b> Shall there be an amendment to the Colorado constitution concerning the state personnel system, and, in connection therewith, expanding the veterans' preference; increasing the number of candidates eligible to be appointed to a position; adjusting the duration of allowable temporary employment; allowing the flexibility to remove a limited number of positions from the system; modifying the residency requirement; adjusting the terms of service for members of the state personnel board; and requiring merit-based appointments to be made through a comparative analysis process?
<b>Amendment 64 (CONSTITUTIONAL)</b> Shall there be an amendment to the Colorado constitution concerning marijuana, and, in connection therewith, providing for the regulation of marijuana; permitting a person twenty-one years of age or older to consume or possess limited amounts of marijuana; providing for the licensing of cultivation facilities, product manufacturing facilities, testing facilities, and retail stores; permitting local governments to regulate or prohibit such facilities; requiring the general assembly to enact an excise tax to be levied upon wholesale sales of marijuana; requiring that the first \$40 million in revenue raised annually by such tax be credited to the public school capital construction assistance fund; and requiring the general assembly to enact legislation governing the cultivation, processing, and sale of industrial hemp?
<b>Amendment 65 (CONSTITUTIONAL)</b> Shall there be amendments to the Colorado constitution and the Colorado revised statutes concerning support by Colorado's legislative representatives for a federal constitutional amendment to limit campaign contributions and spending, and, in connection therewith, instructing Colorado's congressional delegation to propose and support, and the members of Colorado's state legislature to ratify, an amendment to the United States constitution that allows congress and the states to limit campaign contributions and spending?
PUEBLO COUNTY
<b>County Issue 1A</b> Do you want to instruct Pueblo's congressional representatives to propose and support, and Pueblo's State legislators to ratify, an Amendment to the United States Constitution to establish that: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The inherent rights of mankind recognized under the United States Constitution belong to natural human beings only, and not to legally created entities, such as corporations; and</li> <li>Money is not speech, and therefore, limiting political contributions and spending is not equivalent to limiting political speech.</li> </ul>

<b>Ballot Issue No. 3A</b> SHALL PUEBLO COUNTY SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 70 DEBT BE INCREASED \$59,545,000, WITH A REPAYMENT COST OF UP TO \$108,612,000, AND SHALL DISTRICT TAXES BE INCREASED UP TO \$8,289,972 ANNUALLY, FOR ENLARGING, IMPROVING, REPAIRING OR MAKING ADDITIONS TO SCHOOL BUILDINGS, FOR EQUIPPING OR FURNISHING SCHOOL BUILDINGS, FOR IMPROVING SCHOOL GROUNDS, OR ACQUIRING, CONSTRUCTING OR IMPROVING ANY CAPITAL ASSET THAT THE DISTRICT IS AUTHORIZED BY LAW TO OWN, WHICH IMPROVEMENTS MAY INCLUDE BUT ARE NOT LIMITED TO THE FOLLOWING: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>SAFETY AND SECURITY IMPROVEMENTS;</li> <li>ENERGY IMPROVEMENTS;</li> <li>RENOVATING, REPAIRING OR MAKING ADDITIONS TO DISTRICT CLASSROOM FACILITIES;</li> <li>RENOVATING, REPAIRING OR MAKING ADDITIONS TO DISTRICT PHYSICAL EDUCATION FACILITIES; AND</li> <li>RENOVATING, REPAIRING OR MAKING ADDITIONS TO DISTRICT PERFORMING ARTS FACILITIES;</li> </ul>
SUCH DEBT TO BE EVIDENCED BY THE ISSUANCE OF GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS, INSTALLMENT SALE OR LEASE PURCHASE AGREEMENTS, OR OTHER MULTIPLE FISCAL YEAR OBLIGATIONS;
SUCH DEBT TO BE SOLD OR ISSUED IN ONE SERIES OR MORE, FOR A PRICE ABOVE OR BELOW THE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT THEREOF, ON TERMS AND CONDITIONS, AND WITH SUCH MATURITIES AS PERMITTED BY LAW AND AS THE DISTRICT MAY DETERMINE, INCLUDING PROVISIONS FOR REDEMPTION OF THE DEBT PRIOR TO MATURITY WITH OR WITHOUT PAYMENT OF A PREMIUM;
AND SHALL THE MILL LEVY BE INCREASED IN ANY YEAR, WITHOUT LIMITATION OF RATE AND IN AN AMOUNT SUFFICIENT TO PAY THE PRINCIPAL OF, PREMIUM, IF ANY, AND INTEREST ON SUCH DEBT OR ANY REFUNDING DEBT (OR TO CREATE A RESERVE FOR SUCH PAYMENT); AND SHALL THE DISTRICT BE AUTHORIZED TO ISSUE DEBT TO REFUND THE DEBT AUTHORIZED IN THIS QUESTION, PROVIDED THAT AFTER THE ISSUANCE OF SUCH REFUNDING DEBT THE TOTAL OUTSTANDING PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF ALL DEBT ISSUED PURSUANT TO THIS QUESTION DOES NOT EXCEED THE MAXIMUM PRINCIPAL AMOUNT SET FORTH ABOVE, AND PROVIDED FURTHER THAT ALL DEBT ISSUED BY THE DISTRICT PURSUANT TO THIS QUESTION IS ISSUED ON TERMS THAT DO NOT EXCEED THE REPAYMENT COSTS AUTHORIZED IN THIS QUESTION; AND SHALL SUCH TAX REVENUES AND THE EARNINGS FROM THE INVESTMENT OF SUCH BOND PROCEEDS AND TAX REVENUES BE COLLECTED, RETAINED AND SPENT AS A VOTER APPROVED REVENUE CHANGE UNDER ARTICLE X, SECTION 20 OF THE COLORADO CONSTITUTION OR ANY OTHER LAW?
BEULAH AMBULANCE DISTRICT
<b>5A TAX INCREASE TO ADD FIRE PROTECTION SERVICE</b> SHALL THE BEULAH AMBULANCE DISTRICT MILL LEVY FOR GENERAL PROPERTY TAXES BE INCREASED BY 6.5 MILLS FOR A TOTAL OF 13.5 MILLS COMMENCING IN TAX COLLECTION YEAR 2013 FOR TAXES ASSESSED FOR TAX YEAR 2012 FOR ALL AMOUNTS AS MAY BE GENERATED BY SUCH 13.5 MILL LEVY TO PAY THE DISTRICT'S OPERATIONS, MAINTENANCE AND OTHER EXPENSES TO PROVIDE FUNDS TO ALLOW THE DISTRICT TO ADD FIRE PROTECTION SERVICES TO PROPERTIES WITHIN THE BOUNDARIES OF THE DISTRICT AND SHALL THE PROCEEDS OF SUCH TAXES AND INVESTMENT INCOME THEREON BE COLLECTED AND SPENT BY THE DISTRICT AS A VOTER APPROVED REVENUE CHANGE IN 2012 AND IN EACH YEAR THEREAFTER WITHOUT REGARD TO ANY SPENDING, REVENUE RAISING, OR OTHER LIMITATION CONTAINED IN ARTICLE X, SECTION 20 OF THE COLORADO CONSTITUTION OR SECTION 29-1-301 COLORADO REVISED STATUTES, OR ANY OTHER LAW AND WITHOUT LIMITING IN ANY YEAR THE AMOUNT OF OTHER REVENUES THAT MAY BE COLLECTED AND SPENT BY THE DISTRICT?
